

"church treasures". They are wonderful and often have lace.

The official schools in Holland hold training courses for teachers of needle craft. They are very good and modern. The school in Tilburg in Holland teaches bobbin lace and the other schools try it too, these last few years. For years the school taught modern needlepoint, macrame, darning net, etc.; they are very good at it.

There is a costume museum in The Hague too and textile museums at Tilburg and Ensstrade. I think I have to work hard to visit all museums with lace in Europe and keep up with all exhibitions of laces, but I love it.

Last, but not least, I should like to mention the pictures in all museums that show how lace was worn and on which lace was painted with so much love and care.

LACE EXHIBIT IN SCOTLAND

Recently I held an exhibition in my own home of my own lace collection in aid of the Scottish War Blinded. Everybody who came expressed their interest and appreciation although I think many came, not knowing what to expect. I have a very nice print of Vermeers' Lacemaker and under it I hung a piece of lace, "point de neige", of about the same date as Vermeer would have been painting, (mid 17th century).

I have an etching of an old lady making lace done by a local artist (now, alas, deceased). He gave me the etching about 4 years ago. His name was John S. Souler and the old lady was a Mrs. Terry who lived until about 1940. She was the mother of a one-time professor of history at Aberdeen University (who incidentally, wrote a first class book on the composer Bach). Mrs. Souler, who is a friend of mine and still lives in Aberdeen gave me just before the Exhibition a handkerchief edged with pillow lace which Mrs. Terry had made and given to her. I had bobbin winders, lacemakers' flask lights and a "hutch" for carrying one, too and wick lamps, a thread winder and an old box which I bought many years ago with bobbins in it. My collection comprises now of pieces of lace from the 17th century through to the present day and it gave me great pleasure to set it up as I found articles I'd forgotten I had. Shetland lace shawls were much admired (one of which I had made myself). There was lace from Malaya, Paraguay, Teneriffe, Malta, Venice, France, Belgium, England; not much from Scotland but some Ampshire embroidery. A luncheon set edged with lace made at New Pitsigo which was a center of lace-making in the 1870's. It was a cottage industry and although one or two still make it here it has never been widely made; co-called "New Pitsigo" patterns were brought from England and the Continent. I have Alencon of the 17th and 18th centuries and a beautiful hand-

kerchief my son gave me of modern Alencon needlepoint. Fans of Brussels and Honiton lace with guards and sticks of mother of pearl and ivory; Parasols of Honiton and Chantilly with ivory handles, pillows of various types and many and varied bobbins. Some very old, some wooden (of different woods) and some of bone and of ivory, completed the exhibition. As I have said, my friends were all very interested to see it for over the years I have spoken about "lace" and many didn't really understand what I was talking about. As we say in Scotland "They din noo!" I found great interest in it myself for as I have said, I came on things I had forgotten I had. I have also collected books and have now over forty -- some old, some modern. I am interested to see in the Bulletin that many of these, of which I have first editions, are being reprinted. My enthusiasm having been refreshed. I must now pursue my hobby with more energy and perhaps take up the bobbins again.

As I once told you, I have translated Mme. Despierres book on Alencon but some publishers seem to think it is too academic. I enjoyed doing it, however, and given a little more time shall tackle "L'Art de Dismiquer les Dentelles". I did not take any photographs but during our long winter which is now upon us, may set myself to this task too. With best wishes to all lace makers I am now going to have an hour with Miss Eveleth's book which has just reached me and from which I am going to learn a lot!"

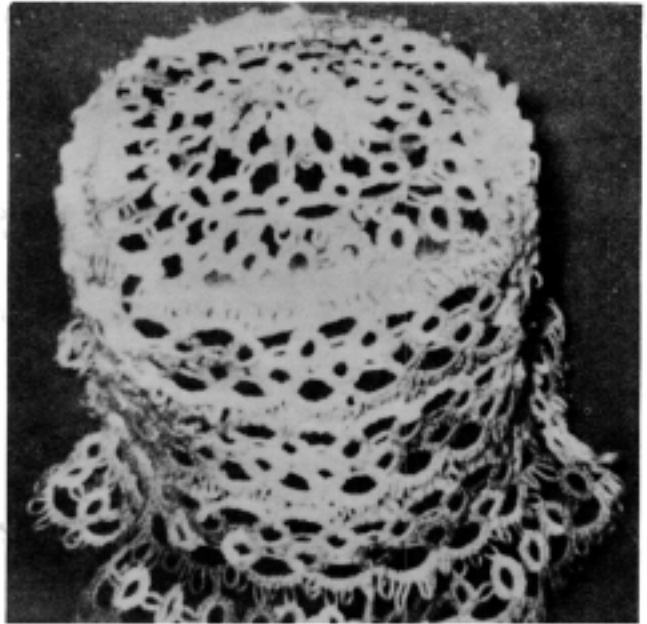

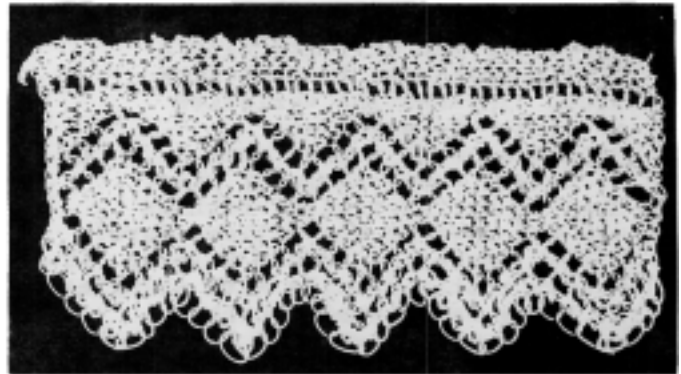

Bobbins A Description and Price Guide

OLD MAID A thin uncurvaceous bobbin with a plain turned shank, light weight. Wood £1-£3 Metal £8 +

BALUSTER Turned on a lathe in an enormous variety of shapes and sizes and weights. This is the basic type for all lace makers Wood £1-£4 Bone £2-£5

BITTED Usually of wood inlaid with a contrasting wood in varying patterns, rarely of wood and bone. £2-£6

SPLICED Two different woods, or rarely wood and bone spliced together, Often made from two broken bobbins. Inscribed varieties very rare. £4 +

SECTIONED Made from slices of varying coloured woods. Mostly heavy, Some without spangles. £2-£5

MOTTLED Wood coloured in patches with Aqua Fortis. £5

CHIP CARVED Not turned on a lathe but carved with a knife or chisel in geometric patterns. £3-£5

WHITTLED Crudely carved by knife, mostly fairly large. £1-£3

DUMP Small and delicate with a single head used to make fine lace. Interesting varieties of wood. No spangles. £1-£3

QUILL Wood with a long neck to take a whole skein of gimp. Used to refill trolley bobbins and not used on the pillow. Rare. £5

THUMPER Large and rather bulbous wooden bobbin usually with spangles. £2-£3

YAK Large heavy wooden bobbin used for making worsted lace, often finely turned. No spangles. £1-£3

TIGER LEOPARD BUTTERFLY
In wood or bone inlaid with pewter. The Tiger has bands or stripes, the Leopard spots, and the Butterfly bands and one or two winged butterfly shapes. £2-£10

TROLLY A fat bobbin with loose pewter rings or gingles. These are sometimes known as Henry VIII's wives- one ring being Catherine of Aragon and six rings Catherine Parr. There are rare examples of wooden trollies with wooden rings and even bone with bone rings. Wood & Pewter £3-£10 Wood £20 +

TALLY Plain wood with broad pewter band around shaft sometimes with Christian name or message hammer tapped on to it. Used for working the plaits on point ground lace. Rare. £10 +

HONITON Simple tapered form with single bead. Often mottle decorated. Usually wood, occasionally bone. No spangle. £1-£3

COLOURED Usually bone, occasionally wood. Dyed red, green or mauve. Often colour has worn thin except where protected by thread on neck. £2-£5

INCISED DOTTED Grooves, lines or dots usually coloured almost always bone. £2 +

WIRED Decorated with tightly bound brass wire. Wood and bone. £2 +

BEADED Embelished with tiny beads on wires in grooves cut around the shank. Most decorative. Usually bone. Rare. £10 +

TINSEL Silver or coloured tinsel set in carved spiral grooves around bone shank. Rare. £10 +

MOTHER-IN-BABE The shank is hollowed out into open compartments containing one or more miniature bobbins. Wood and bone. £20 +

COW-IN-CALF made in two or three sections which unscrew to reveal a minature bobbin inside. Very rare. £20 +

BIRDCAGE Similar to Mother-in-Babe but with balls or beads instead of a minature bobbin in the hollow compartment. £16 +

CHURCH WINDOW Shank pierced or drilled but with no loose object inside. Wood £10 + Bone £15 +

INSCRIBED BOBBINS Capital letters formed of coloured dots were drilled either straight along the shank or spirally around. Mostly of bone though wood was used occasionally. The main types are:- Initials, christian names, names and surnames, names and dates, births, marriages and deaths, sweet and loves, dear relatives and names, gifts and presents, love and romance, religious, famous people, hangings, miscellaneous.

INSCRIBED BOBBINS (Part 1)
By Denys Bellerby

The most common inscribed bobbins are those with a single christian name. This is natural enough as every lace maker would have wanted to have a bobbin with her name on it and also that of her boy friend, husband and children. On the whole I have found that girls names outnumber boys by about two to one. I have over two hundred different names (many more if variations of spelling were included). These are mostly ordinary nineteenth century names such as John, James, George, Henry, Ann, Betsy, Lucy, Mary, Sally, etc., plus a number of names with biblical connotations - Ames, Joel, Benjamin, Rebecca, Kizeah, Leah - which are not so usual today.

Occasionally one comes upon bobbins with initials only. These are usually of wood with the letters formed of inlaid brass pins, though bone bobbins with the usual drilled and coloured holes also occur.

For some reason bobbins with name and surname are much less common than those with just a christian name; possibly bobbin makers kept a stock of common names and would sell these more cheaply than special orders from an individual.

It is always nice to know when an antique was made and we are fortunate that many bobbins were inscribed with dates as well as names - almost as good as the hall mark on English silver, and a date on a bobbin roughly doubles its value. Mostly these dated bobbins commemorated a birth, marriage or death:-

Emily Victoria Harres Born Jan 1 1844
 Matilda Warren Marry 1865
 Samuel Nightingale Died No 26 1821
 or even just like John Russel 1839. The majority of dated bobbins I have acquired come from the golden fifty year period between 1820 and 1870 though there are a few others both earlier and later. Next to be considered are the Endearment bobbins: - My Dear Father, Dear Mother - Sister - Brother - Uncle - Aunt - Cousin and names - Dear Susan, Dear James. Then come the very rare Sweet and Lovlies -- Sweet William, Lovily Thomas - doubtless an embarrassment to the boy but a special pleasure for the lace maker using that bobbin.

Bobbins were often given as presents and we have recorded examples such as:-

- A Gift For A Friend
- A Present From My Father 1854
- A Keep Sake

The Gift is Small But Love is All
 Take This Small Gift I Freely Give,
 May God Protect You While You Live

In the next article I propose to give examples of Love and Romance -- Kiss Me Quick, I Long To Wed The Lad I Love. In the meantime here is a guide to the price of the types of bobbins described above:

BOOK REVIEWS

LACE IN THE MAKING WITH BOBBINS AND NEEDLE, by Margaret L. Brooke, Robin and Russ Handweavers, 164 pages..... \$9.95 Originally published in 1923, this reprint is a valuable service to lacemakers. One of the few books of instruction to include the author's new methods, it has long been out-of-print and little known. Blessed with very clear large-scale drawings and detailed text, the elementary stitches and techniques are easily seen. A great many basic, but not simple, matters such as shaping clothwork, adding in and tying off bobbins, pricking for nets and so on, often ignored in other books, are spelled out here.

There are, however, no lace patterns, with the exception of one reduced Brussels sprig, and a beginner will find the book most useful as a reference to use with a good basic text that has patterns, such as the DMC Pillow Lace or Mincoff and Marriage's classic. The real audience for Brooke are the lacemakers who have mastered basic skills and wish now to expand their technical vocabulary. For the designer and contemporary worker, Brooke offers a wealth of variations on grounds, fillings, edges, braids, bars and nets, and an inspiring array of ornamental clothwork. There are ideas here for lacemakers of all levels of experience. A brief chapter on needle lace, only 10 pages, does have very clear drawings of the basic stitches, and a short historical chapter concludes the book. Highly recommended, and well printed and bound.

TRADITIONAL BOBBIN LACE: --- PATTERNS in TORCHON, GUIPURE AND IDRIA, by G. Biedermann and M. Anderson, Some Place, \$6.50

A portfolio with 53 patterns for a variety of edgings, doilies, insertions, collars and ornamental motifs. The attractive patterns are printed on blue card, ready for pricking, with a brief list of reference books, explanations of symbols and notes on more difficult items. The working indications should be clear to lacemakers with some experience and the patterns would be a plus in anyone's repertoire. Unhappily, many of the finer sizes of linen thread called for have recently gone off the market, and a table of substitutes in cotton would be a useful supplement to the package. 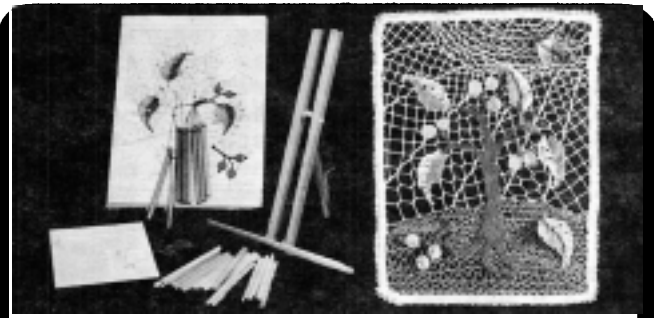

A fuller descriptive list can be requested from the Librarian by sending a stamped addressed envelope and 10 cents to cover duplicating costs. To request any book, please ask for it by title and author and send the amount shown, to the Librarian. Allow 2 weeks for receipt. A letter giving mailing instructions, replacement cost and other details will be sent to each borrower with the books.

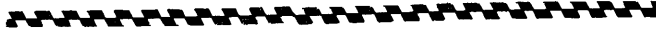

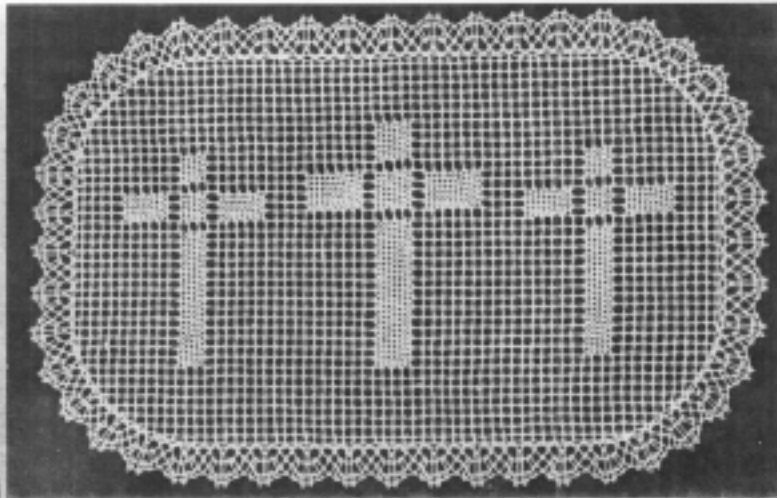

Ecclesiastical Lace

January 13, 1976

"All the lace that I have done has been on church linens as memorials, and with God's help, I have been able to make some beautiful things. I am an Episcopalian and in our Baptismal service we give the mother of babies the new wipe cloth---to use in confirmation, wedding, etc. as a continuing reminder of God's Love. Nell, my youngest daughter, goes with her husband to the Presbyterian Church and Baptism time came. I made a 6" little hankie out of my fine linen (I bought about 35 yards when I found it was getting hard to get) lace all around (with perfect corners), lace to match one I put on our little slip. I embroidered the shell in one corner as I do on our towels. I went to see the pastor and asked that he use it, but not mention it to my daughter, Julie, as she knew nothing about it. Well, the day came and everything went fine; as the Pastor handed Carrie back to her dad he reached out to Julie as to shake hands and she had the hankie. She looked at it and looked out to me and just beamed! She was so thrilled and pleased and the Pastor again thanked me for telling him about the custom.

There will be an Ecclesiastical display in "Hess" - our biggest Dept. Store this week that I am anxious to go in to see to get ideas. Many of my pieces are in the display including a beautiful 5 yard long "Fair Linen" that I made as a Memorial to my mother (we have a large Altar) with lace on each end, embroidery, four (6" patterns) and 1 - 12" pattern.

As each of my grand-children became confirmed, I let them pick out a lace pattern and made a lavabo towel that they gave to the church. Another one is taking the training now, so I better get him picking out his pattern. I understand that we need another cover for the Communion table, so maybe that will be his gift; - lace all around.

One more dear little thing that I made was a set for private communion; a 3" little pall to cover the communion cup (usually they are 6" to 7").

- 1 - 12" corporal" to lay on the table
- 1 - 9½" "veil" to cover the whole thing
- 3 - 7" towels for wiping (purificators) are with various size crosses. This went to a dear young clergyman who left us to work with college students in Columbia, S. C." - Mrs. J. F. Barr, Penn.

Lace-Making

A CRAFT STILL IN THE 16TH CENTURY

BRUGES, Belgium - Each afternoon the main hall of the school of the Apostoline Sisters in this peaceful Flemish city comes alive with a click-clack sound that is as important to Bruges as the chiming of its many church bells, but there is deep pessimism about the future.

A dozen young girls and women work busily moving linen threads attached to dozens of wooden bobbins back and forth across a pattern of pins stuck in cushions, making the world-famous Bruges lace.

The slow, demanding technique has changed little since lace was invented in Flanders more than 400 years ago to decorate the collars and cuffs of the gentry. The original "cottage" system of the industry in which women do individual piece-work at home or in small groups is also unchanged.

But much is different also. Seventy-five years ago there were still thousands of women in Bruges and other Flemish towns who earned a living producing lace. Now there are only a few hundred left, mainly married women in their sixties who keep up the traditional craft to pass time and earn pocket money.

Fading Out Steadily

The small number of lace traders still active in Belgium, mainly as a side business, fear that in 20 years production will virtually disappear, making it impossible to fill the healthy tourist demand for lace in Brussels and Bruges.

"If we lose one of our workers now, we can't find a new one," said Renilde Luc, whose family (on her mother's side) has been trading in Brussels style lace for four generations. Every two weeks Miss Luc and her mother bring self-designed patterns and material to a few dozen women in the tiny village of Denderhoutem, 30 miles west of Brussels, and pick up finished place mats, tablecloths and collars for sale in Brussels' 40 or so lace shops.

"Brussels" or "Renaissance" style lace is made from machine-produced strips of material that are handsewn into intricate patterns by the individual lace makers. "Bruges" style lace which is rarer and more expensive, is made completely by hand with the pin and bobbin method.

In Bruges, Paul Muylle, whose family-run business is a leading producer, relies on work from about 100 lace makers. "Production is going down every year," he said. "Some designs are now being made by only one lace-maker."

Mr. Muylle also complains that getting the fine linen and cotton thread needed for the lace is increasingly difficult

since textile mills refuse to make the material in the small lots needed. "We now go around buying up old stocks whenever we can so we have a reserve," he said.

A Slight Upsurge Noted

The only encouraging sign for the industry in Belgium has been renewed interest recently among girls and young women in lace making as a handcraft.

Enrollment is up above 300 in the Apostoline Sisters' lace school, which is the last remaining of the four convent schools that trained generations of Bruges lace makers. In 1969, as an effort to keep the skill alive, the school was turned into a state-supported foundation.

The dealers hope that some of those now learning the craft will eventually produce lace for commercial sales and not just for their own homes. But they have little direct control over this, since lace making defies industrial organization in much the same way medieval Bruges has so far resisted the bustle and architecture of the 20th century.

The key problem is that lace production has long since ceased to be a money-making proposition. The women who now do it earn what amounts to 25 to 50 cents an hour. Most live on their husband's income or pension and use the extra money for personal things.

An Old Social Custom

They make lace, sitting in their small, gossip coffee circles, out of social custom and an age-old Flemish urge to keep busy. They work for whom they want, when they want and money is important mainly as a matter of pride. "It's a very special mentality," Miss Luc said. "It wouldn't work at all if they were in a big factory."

This style of work has no appeal for younger women who can earn a good wage in a factory or want to raise a family.

At present the home-produced lace is eventually sold in shops at a 400 to 500 percent mark-up. The dealers say that bringing women into plants to produce the lace for a modern industrial wage would drive the price far beyond what customers would pay.

A 45-inch square linen table cloth with fine Bruges lace edging now costs \$90. for example; a small 10-inch square handkerchief in point de fee stitching, the finest now made in Bruges, takes two months of work and costs \$300.

Looks Belgian

Another reason why higher cost production is impossible is competition from oriental lace production. Some lace shop owners in Brussels and Bruges have turned to products from China and Hong Kong, selling it as Belgian production.

The lace looks much like the Belgian product, although the fiber is normally coarser. Belgian experts have still not been able to determine if the oriental lace is handmade or produced by machine. Since the quality control on the origin of the product is not strictly enforced the best way the customer can be sure of getting authentic Belgian lace is to demand a signed guarantee from the shopkeeper.

Because of the dropping Belgian production, there has been a small surge in buying fine lace for its antique value, according to Mr. Muylle. He says that now a high quality piece gains 10 percent or more in value a year.

HONITON LACE

"Reading two mentions of Honiton Lace in my January bulletin, I felt I should write and ask you to correct some misunderstandings.

Honiton Lace is made with a very fine cotton thread. Its traditional patterns are worked on a flat-ball shaped pillow so that it can be turned and worked from any angle. Simple light bobbins are used with the fine thread and where flowers and leaves touch in the pattern a join is made by passing a working bobbin through a loop from the second worker, drawn through the adjoining edge so that bobbins with beads or bulbous ends cannot be used." - Mrs. Sheila D. Rare art hangs on by thread in Quad-City

Mrs. Mary VanDeVoorde is one of the few Quad-City Belgian women still proficient in the art of hand-made lace.

And that's only fitting, since she was born in Pittem, West Flanders, Belgium, which was the lace-making center of Belgium before World War I.

"During the war, the Germans destroyed all the patterns and factories. All the girls made lace in Pittem. The rich ones made it for themselves and the poor ones made the lace to sell for money," she said.

Mrs. VanDeVoorde, one of the poor ones, was taught lace-making when she began school around 6 or 7 years of age. At 12 she began attending lace-making school full time.

"We would spend two hours studying reading and writing, then would spend the rest of the day making lace," she said.

At the age of 80, Mrs. VanDeVoord's nimble fingers fly over her cushion as she works her bobbins, thread and pins over a piece of lace.

She also belongs to the Moline Lace-makers Club. "We all knew each other in Belgium. We went to lace-making school together. Then after the war, we came to this country one by one and ended up in Moline together again making lace," said Mrs. VanDeVoorde.

THE CLUB, formed in 1945, originally had 12 members; only six survive.

"We wanted to have the lace-making class so this piece of Belgian Culture would survive," said Dolores Bultinck of the Belgian Center.

"All of the women currently in the club are in their late 70s or early 80s and they won't be here forever. Even at that the few girls who really want to gain in skill and knowledge will probably have to go to Belgium for further study. By the time they get to that level, the original members will probably be gone," she said. Mrs. VanDeVoorde agreed.

"The younger girls are not really interested in lace-making. It's just some-

thing to do right now. They have other interests," she said.

LACE is a permanent fixture of the VanDeVoorde home. Doilies and curtains -- all made by Mrs. VanDeVoorde -- adorn the home. Lace cuffs and collars have been added to dresses. Thread, bobbins and pins are supplied by relatives still living in Belgium or are bought on trips back to Europe.

Mrs. VanDeVoorde lived in Chicago with

her husband for 34 years, during which time she only made lace once.

"I was the Belgium representative at the World's Fair in 1933. I had to borrow someone else's cushion to make the lace on for demonstration at the fair," she said.

When her husband, Gus, retired in 1967, they returned to Moline and she joined the lace-making club.

"It was just a hobby. The husbands would gather and play cards and the wives would make lace," she said.

At exhibitions sponsored by the Belgian Cultural Center the lace is sold at little cost. While in Belgium, Mrs. VanDeVoorde made about \$5.00 a month for her lacework. Today she sells her lace for what amounts to between 25 and 50 cents per hour of work.

petition from machine-made products, decreased demand for the handmade, changes in fashion, and lack of appreciation of the fine delicate lace for which the country is noted.

Not so in Western Illinois. Officials of the Center For Belgian Culture, headquartered on 7th St. in Moline, find the public keenly interested in lacemaking and lace pieces. And, of course, the Moline Lacemakers, a group of area women dedicated to preserving the art, are known the world over for their skills, dexterity with the bobbins and exquisite lace products.

In Belgium, lacemaking lessons begin with the very young. So it is in Western Illinois. Recently, lacemaking students, ages 8 to 16, studied on Saturday mornings at the center, under the direction of Martha Bultinck and Mary Vande Voorde, both of Moline, and Madeleine Secru of Rock Island.

In these classes, another generation learned to take pride in Belgian lacemaking. The young students proved that lacemaking is not a lost art, at least it isn't in Western Illinois.

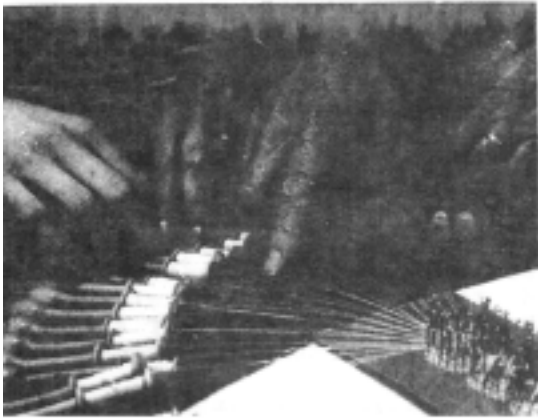

Inscribed Bobbins (Part 2)

By far the largest number of bobbins bearing messages are those with a love motif. The invitational KISS ME, KISS ME QUICK, LOVE ME. The flirtatious I LOVE THE BOYS followed by the proposal LOVE GIVE ME THY HEART. Once accepted the message is BUY THE RING and I have a rare refusal JOE SERMIE NOT FOR ME KNOW IT also a JOSEPH NOT FOR ME KNOW IT (may be Joe was a bit of a lad, it would be interesting to know the background to this stiff rebuff!)

Once engaged the bobbin would be I LOVE YOU or better still I LOVE YOU MY DEAR IT IS TRUE, but if the romance were broken the poor girl sometimes rubbed salt into the wound by having a bobbin made saying IT IS HARD TO BE SLITED BY ONE AS I LOVES or LOVE IS SHARP TO FEAL THE SMART, after this trauma she might well consider LET NO FALUS (false) LOVER GAIN MY HART or DONT BE FALCES to present to her next boyfriend. There are protest messages too, such as LOVE ME OR LEAVE ME ALONE or LOVE DONT BE CRUEL followed by aspirations I LONG TO WED THE LAD I LOVE and TO LOVE AND LIVE HAPPY, THAT IS MY DESHIR (desire).

When the loved one went away a parting present was often a bobbin inscribed FORGET ME NOT or WHEN THIS YOU SEE REMEMBER ME with the injunction LOVE ME TRULEY or BE CONSTANT AND TRUE TO ME MY DEAR. To finish with a happy note, any pillow would be enhanced with a bobbin saying LOVE or TRUE LOVE or even better I LOVE MY LOVE BECAUSE I NO MY LOVE LOVES ME.

Antique bobbins are scarce and becoming scarcer, but inscribed bobbins bearing messages particularly fetching love calls are seldom seen except in museums and specialist collections. There are about 200 examples of these now on offer, once these have gone it is unlikely that it will be possible to find replacements. Wooden ones with short messages of the LOVE ME I LOVE U variety are available at £8.00, bone are from £10.00. In a short article of this nature it has only been possible to quote a few of the messages available but all are of a comparable nature.

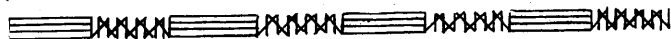
In my next article I hope to give examples of bobbins issued to commemorate the hanging of murderers, which started when one man was foolish enough to murder his wife -- who was a lace maker!

A Lesson in Reticella

(From #Modern Priscilla", Nov. 1921)

Greek lace or Reticella as it is known in Italy is one of the oldest laces. It is said to have been first made in the Ionian Islands and later to have traveled to Italy. It has always been very much used for ecclesiastical and household purposes and the finer makes for personal adornment.

At present it is popular for house linens and is a beautiful additional ornament used with cutwork or filet and satin embroidery, working in as it does as a different and yet harmonizing note.

The design, which is usually geometric, is stamped on cambric which is later basted upon one or two thicknesses of muslin to give it the necessary body. Flax thread is most commonly used for the lace; sometimes a coarse size being employed for the foundation and the filling done with a finer number, then again the same size is used for both foundation and filling.

The principle of the work is lace stitches made on a foundation of couched threads. Use a very fine sewing cotton and baste or couch the linen thread to the pattern following the principal lines and taking stitches directly across the linen thread, never at a slant on the right side. The reason for this will be understood when the threads are being covered. Take the stitches close enough together to retain the details of the pattern and be sure to take a stitch at each angle.

It is desirable to have as few joinings as possible in the foundation thread, so careful study must be made of the pattern to determine the best method of procedure in couching. Use a piece of thread sufficiently long for the medallion so that it will not have to be pieced unnecessarily.

The diagram of the star medallion shows the best method of basting on the thread which is as follows: Begin at A, couch

to B and turn to the left following the scalloped line all around, taking short stitches and being sure to take a stitch at each turn. When B is reached again, draw the couching thread through the first turn, using a crochet hook, then continue to C; turn to the left and follow circle around, pull through at C and continue to D. Repeat at D and E, then continue straight across to F, to G, H, I, J, K, and L and go all around the star. The double threads at some parts will not matter.

On this particular medallion No. 25 linen thread was used for the couching and No. 60 for the filling, which makes a very fine beautiful lace. All the threads are either wrapped or covered with buttonholing, except the very outer row which is left uncovered until the medallion is inserted in the linen when it is, of course, covered. If it were wrapped now, the edge would be bulky to insert.

For the filling, begin at any point on the edge and wrap all the way across. Fasten off thread. Continue doing this until three diameters are wrapped, then begin at X and wrap across to 1; buttonhole along circle to right until two stitches beyond the center of space, take buttonhole stitch back on bar towards left over three stitches and fill loop thus made with wrapping stitches, See detail of picot. Continue around, putting a picot in every space.

When 1 is reached, wrap to 2 and work the point between 2 and 4. To do this, buttonhole across to 4, carry the thread back and fasten in first stitch with buttonhole stitch, then work across to right again, taking stitches in the previous row over the loose thread. See detail of point. The rows will naturally narrow themselves by one stitch each time until the point 6 is reached. Take a stitch around couched thread on circle, carry thread to 3 on edge of medallion and wrap back to point. Whip down side of point to 4 and continue with other points all around. The line diagram shows the

work completed through middle of second point.

When all the points are made the needle is back at 2 again. From here wrap to 5, buttonhole on circle to right as far as 6, carry thread to 7, fasten a stitch to couched thread, keeping the thread a little loose so that it will not be a straight line, carry thread to 8, fasten around couched thread, back to 7, again to 8, and wrap back to 7, carry to 9, repeat process, carry to 10, keep thread loose, fasten to couched thread, carry thread back to 7 and 6, again to 7 and 10, and buttonhole back to 7 and 6, putting picot in each space. Buttonhole to 11 and make other loops and bars the same all around

At 5 wrap to 12, buttonhole all around scallops, putting in the wrapped bars (over 3 threads) connecting this line with the edge as they are reached. Wrap from 12 to 13 and leave outside line unfinished until set into linen.

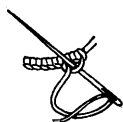
Care must be taken throughout this work not to catch the stitches through the

cambric foundation as the lace is only basted to this and is removed when the filling stitches are completed. In the progress of the work everything should be made as strong as possible. Where two bars cross, a stitch should be made to join them firmly so that when the lace is removed from the foundation they cannot come apart.

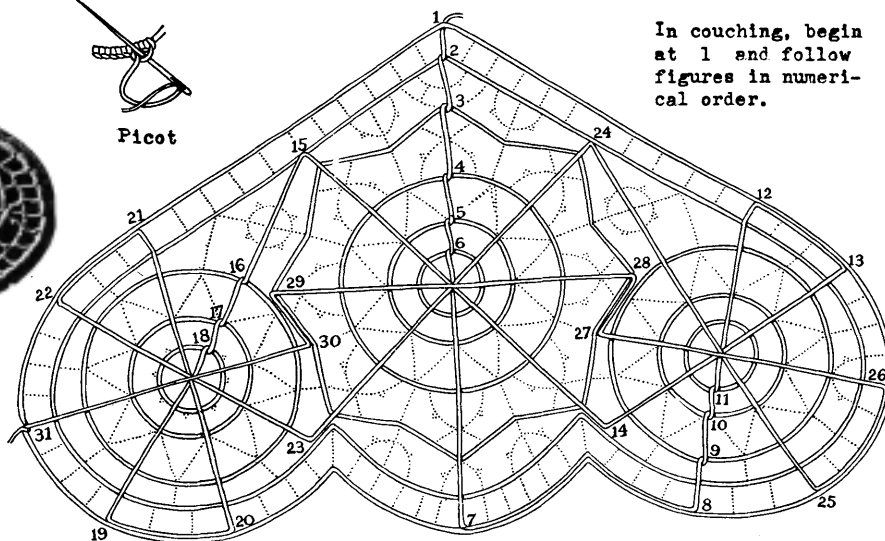
The medallion to be inserted in linen is carefully basted in place and the edges buttonholed to the linen or whipped over and over as one would work an eyelet, then the linen is cut away from beneath. Of course, if a piece of Reticella is not to be used as an insert, the outlines are finished just as the other lines are, sometimes with buttonholing and picots to give a pretty finish.

A Medallion of Reticella Lace. The first process, couching the foundation threads, forms a nice problem, which is successfully explained in the full size diagram.



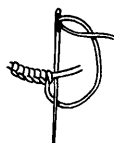

In couching, begin at 1 and follow figures in numerical order.

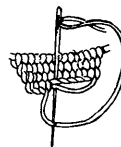


Wrapping

Medallions for Reticella Lace are made separately and inserted into the linen by basting in place, overcasting the edges, and cutting away the linen beneath. These bits of lace make an excellent work for picking up at odd moments and require very little equipment. There is nothing lovelier with fine linen than Reticella..



Filling a Point

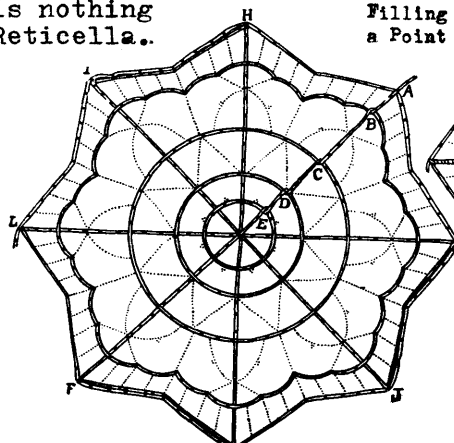


Diagram for Couching G

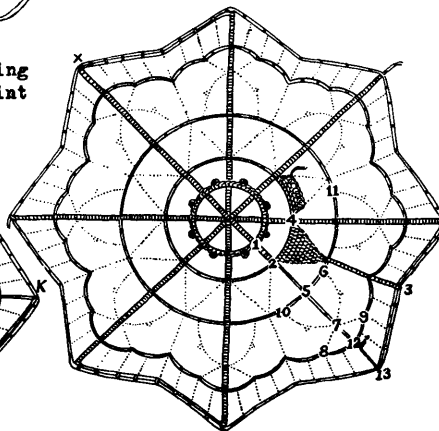


Diagram for Filling

BOOK REVIEWS

NEW USES FOR OLD LACES, by Jean Ray Laury, Doubleday & Company, 109 pages....\$8.95 Subtitled "How to recycle flea market and attic finds," this book provides fresh ideas for using and displaying a lace collection. The author takes into account the fact that what one finds in attics or flea markets these days is rarely fine or very old lace, but rather lots of relatively recent crochet, tatting, drawn-work and yard lace, both hand-made and machine-made. What to do with multiple doilies, chairsets, dresser scarves and so on is a question that puzzles many collectors. Ms. Laury combines them with stitchery, applique and quilting into wall hangings, coverlets, clothing and cushions, including suggestions for using even scraps and bits of torn and damaged pieces. She tells how to frame good-quality undamaged handwork to display as is. I would personally have preferred to see some hints on how to work larger pieces into panels and collages without cutting them up, such as covering the "unwanted" areas with fabric to match the background, or letting portions of lace pass through slits to the wrong side of the composition. This may seem overly conservative in the case of ordinary laces, but it would allow both the preservation of the integrity of the original while using it now, and the option to take the item apart and re-use the parts in future. In addition, many pieces can in fact still be used as originally intended as accent pieces to modern interior decor. All in all a useful book, lavishly illustrated and full of suggestions

Two books reviewed here in the original Swedish editions are now available in English, both published by Van Nostrand Reinhold. **TATTING: Patterns and Designs** by Gun Blomqvist and Elwy Person (reviewed Jan. 1973) is 96 pages in hardcover, at \$6.50. The same excellent symbolic system as in the original is used for the directions, and the patterns are the same lovely doilies, edgings and bridal crowns. Highly recommended.

NEW DESIGNS IN LACE MAKING by K. Malmberg and N. Thorlin, is 96 pages, paper-bound at \$3.50. This is a translation of **Knyppe**, on new materials and approaches to bobbin lace (reviewed July 1974). The translation is somewhat lame in places and uses unorthodox terms such as "double cloth stitch", "spool" as a verb meaning "to wind", and other ambiguities. Despite this, the experienced worker will have no trouble understanding, and should enjoy the unusual designs and applications of the laces.
